Warblers: Parts 1, 2, 3

The fall migration of Warblers is an exciting event for birders. It can also daunting because many of these tiny tree-top insectivores lack the distinctive breeding plumage that makes them so memorable. How do we sort through the many similar features and identify the individuals we find? Why are there so many species on our checklist which (according to the range maps) shouldn't be here at all? In this three-part online presentation, instructor Matthew Dodder will guide you through the basic (and not-so-basic) challenges of our "confusing Fall Warblers". We will discuss places to go to find Warblers, what field marks and behaviors to watch for, and how to enjoy some of the most confusing and enigmatic migrants of the fall season.

Conservation Corner

A Busy Month

This August, we submitted advocacy letters on six major issues. These included protecting tree buffer zones (Mountain View development), wildlife migration corridors (Santa Teresa Hills), dark skies (electronic billboards), riparian corridors (Almaden Office project along Guadalupe River), open space (Coyote Valley), and bird safety (Reid-Hillview Airport)! We thank everyone for their support offering public comments for advocating against electronic billboards in San Jose and against the Almaden Office Project infringing on the Guadalupe River riparian corridor in downtown San Jose.

Some Successes

After months of advocacy we have some exciting successes for environmental protections to report! The Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors officially went into creative partnership with Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District and agreed to have dual-enforcement of the Ridgeline Easement along Permanente Ridge. Additionally, the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to "take all necessary actions, including closure, to immediately prevent lead contamination from operations at Reid-Hillview Airport". The dual-enforcement will help preserve existing open space and it seems we might have an opportunity to enhance open space upon the possible closure of Reid-Hillview Airport.
